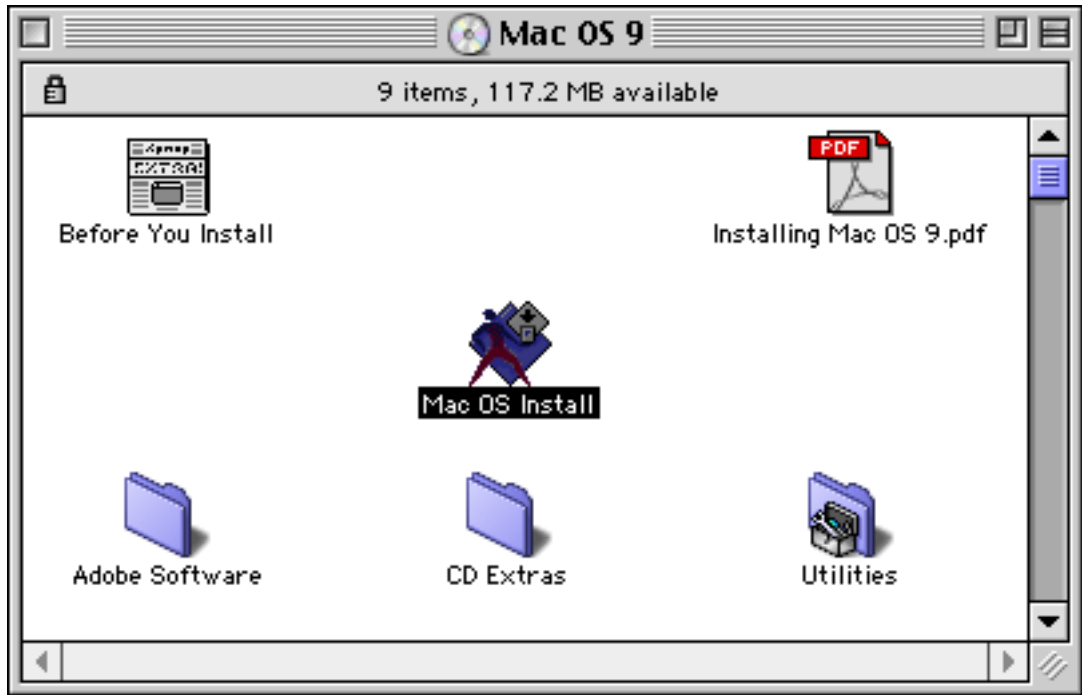
How to Install the Central European Language Kit and Fonts on a Macintosh

The Last Expression web site is multilingual, with German and Polish translations of the essays, as well as foreign words in the art labels and descriptive text. The support for the full range of diacritical marks on the Macintosh is only available using Mac OS 9.0 or later. To properly view the Polish text, you must do a custom install of the "Central European Language Kit" and extra fonts. Keep in mind, however, that if it's not crucial to view all the special Polish characters with complete accuracy, it will probably not hinder your appreciation for the text or images to see a few misplaced characters.

If you are on a Macintosh with Mac OS 9.0 or later and you would like to view the site with perfect display of Polish diacritics, use the following step-by-step instructions to install the Central European Language Kit and its extra fonts. After doing this custom installation, the diacritical marks on the web site should appear properly in the current versions of both Netscape Communicator and Microsoft Internet Explorer.

Step 1

Insert your Apple-supplied Mac OS 9 CD. A window similar to the one below appears. Double-click the “Mac OS Install” icon to run the Mac OS 9 installer.



Step 2

The “Welcome” window appears. Click the “Continue” button.



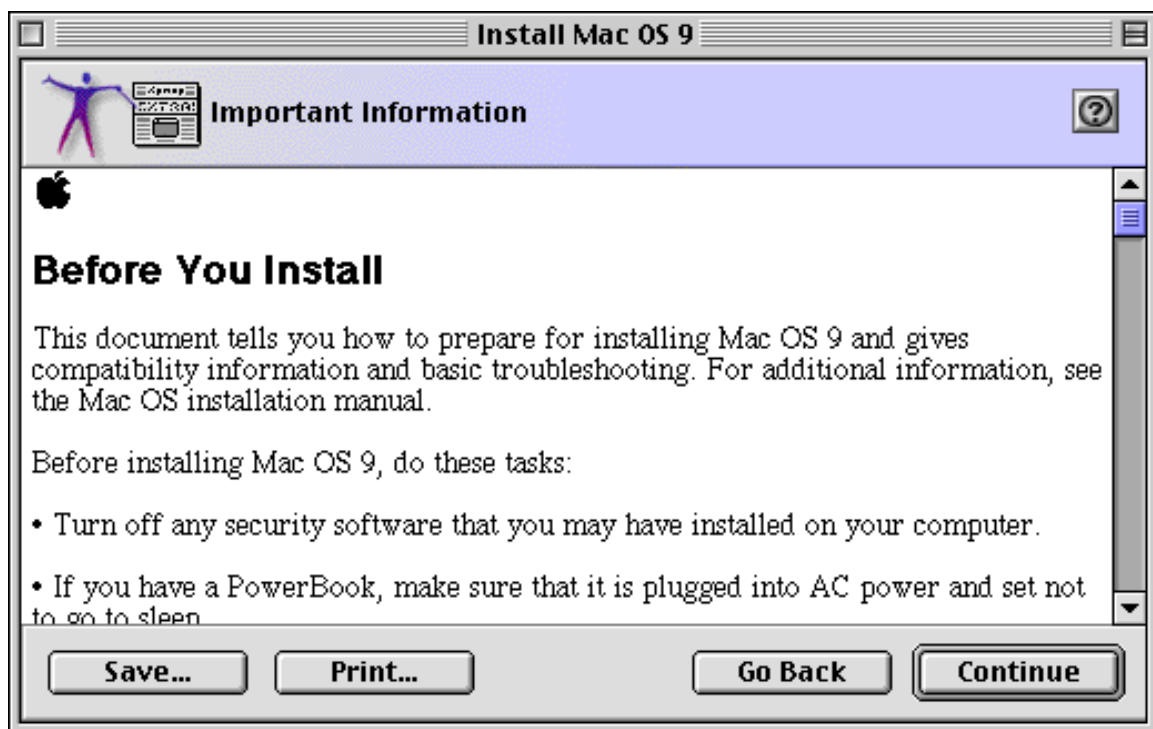
Step 3

The “Select Destination” window appears. Use the “Destination Disk” popup menu to select your system disk (hard drive) if it is not already selected. Then click the “Select” button. (Your system disk is the one that contains your System Folder.)



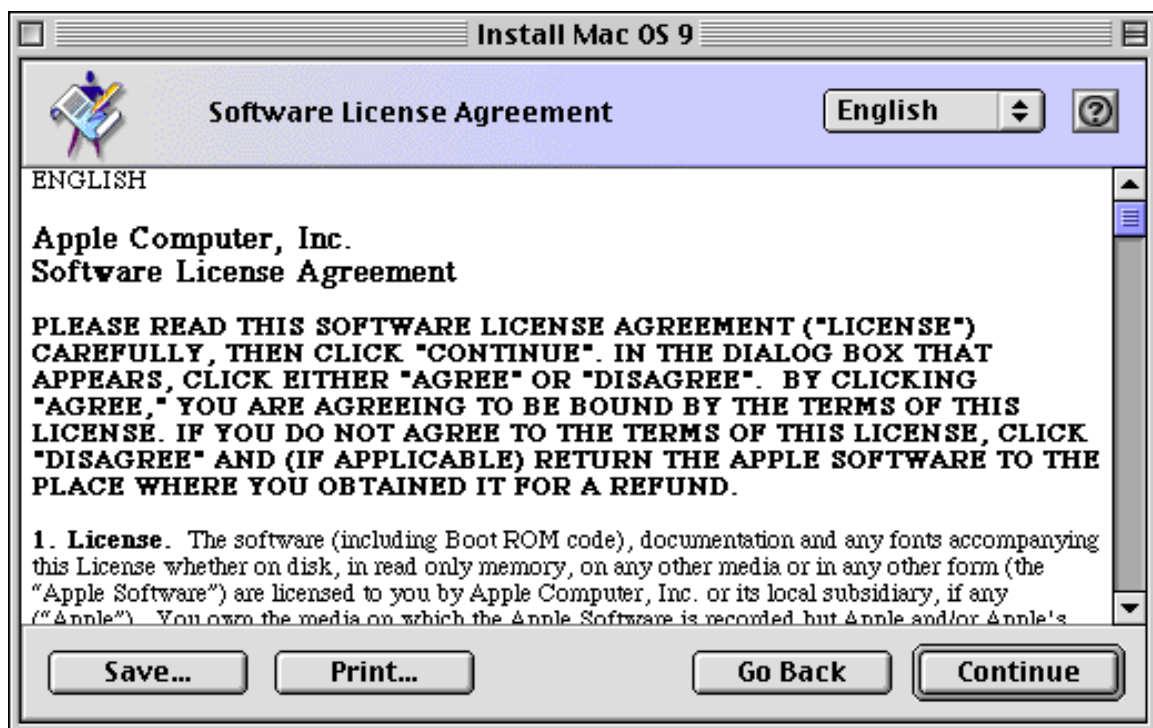
Step 4

The “Important Information” window appears. Click the “Continue” button.



Step 5

The “Software License Agreement” window appears. Click the “Continue” button.



Step 6

The alert shown below appears. Click the “Agree” button.



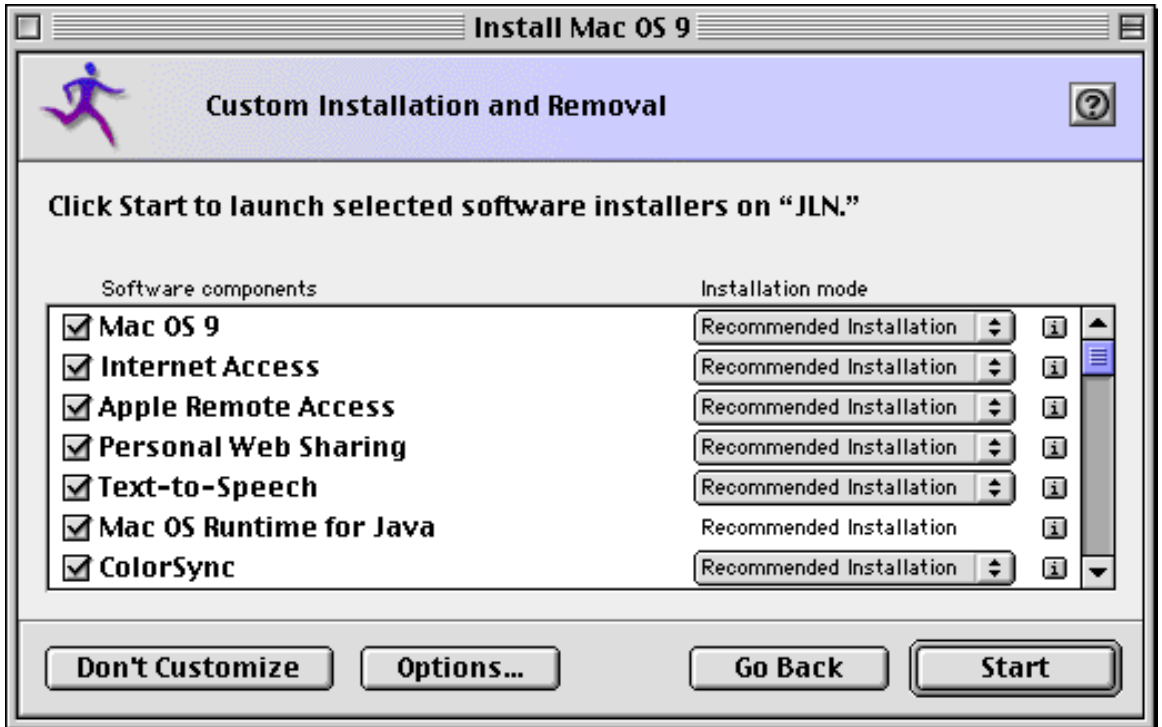
Step 7

The “Install Software” window appears. Click the “Customize” button.
Do not click the “Start” button!



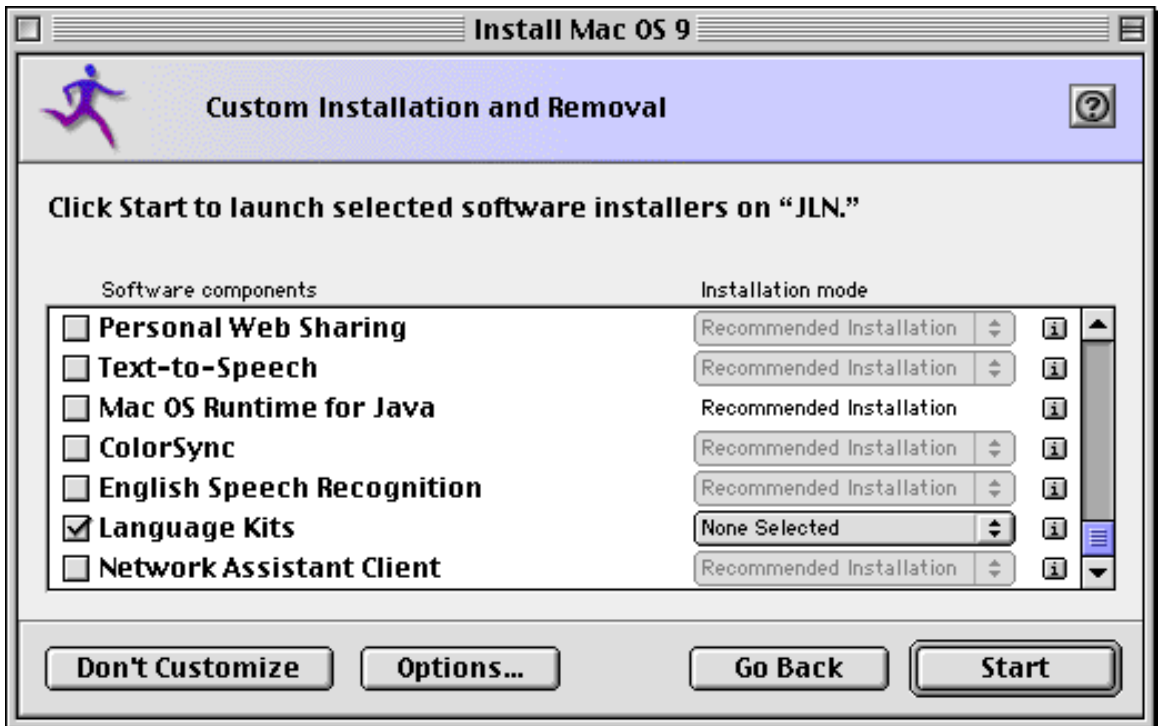
Step 8

The “Custom Installation and Removal” window appears. Deselect all the software packages (click the boxes to make the check marks disappear).



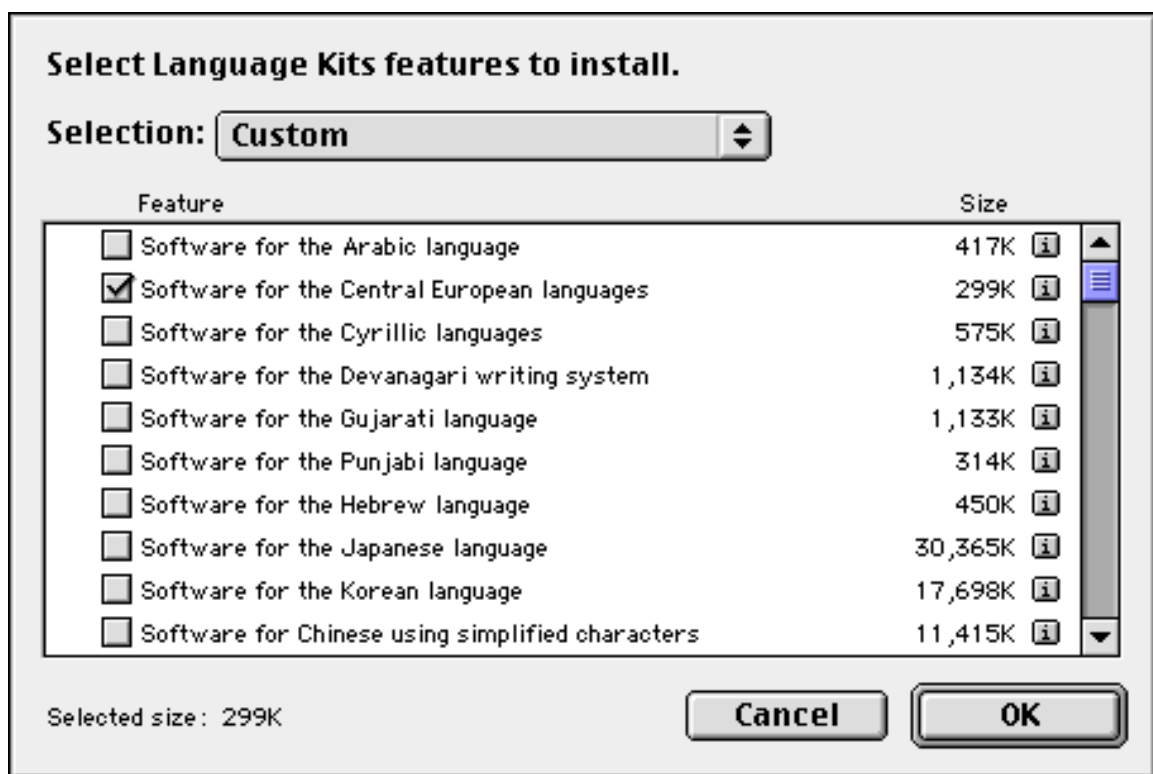
Step 9

Scroll down to see the rest of the software packages. Select the “Language Kits” package (click the box to make the check mark appear). Use the popup menu labeled “None Selected” to select the “Customized Installation” option for the Language Kits package.



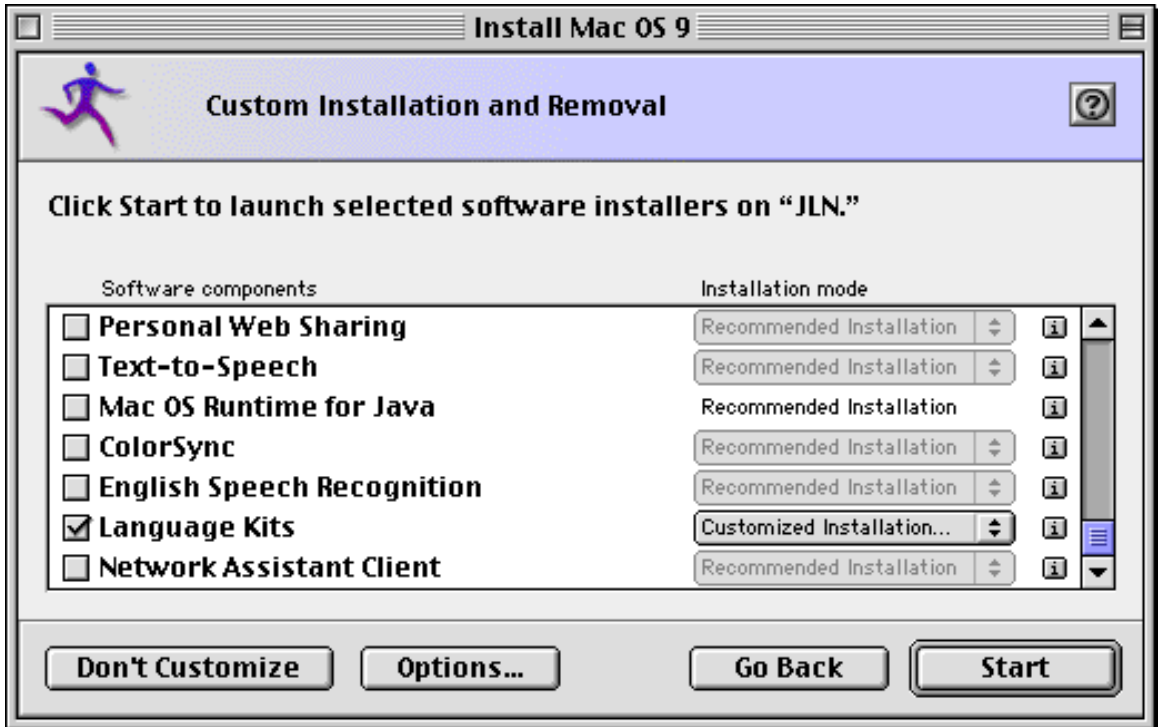
Step 10

The custom installation dialog for the Language Kits package appears. Select the “Software for the Central European languages” item (click the box to make the check mark appear). Then click the “OK” button.



Step 11

The installer returns to the “Custom Installation and Removal” window. Click the “Start” button.



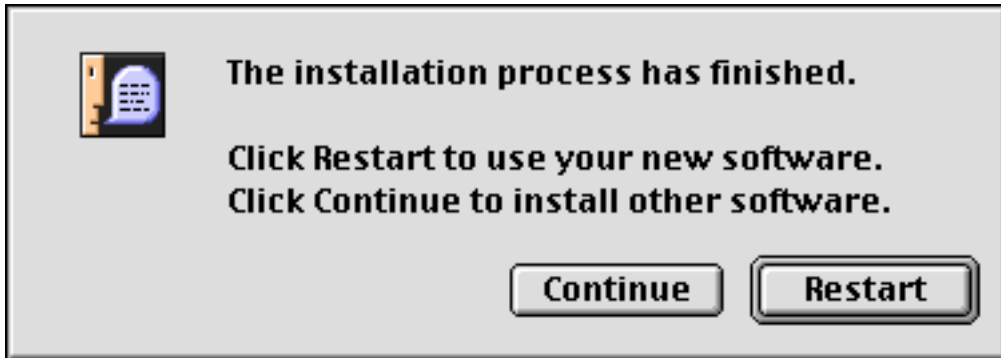
Step 12

The alert shown below appears. Click the “Continue” button to begin the installation. The installation will take several minutes.



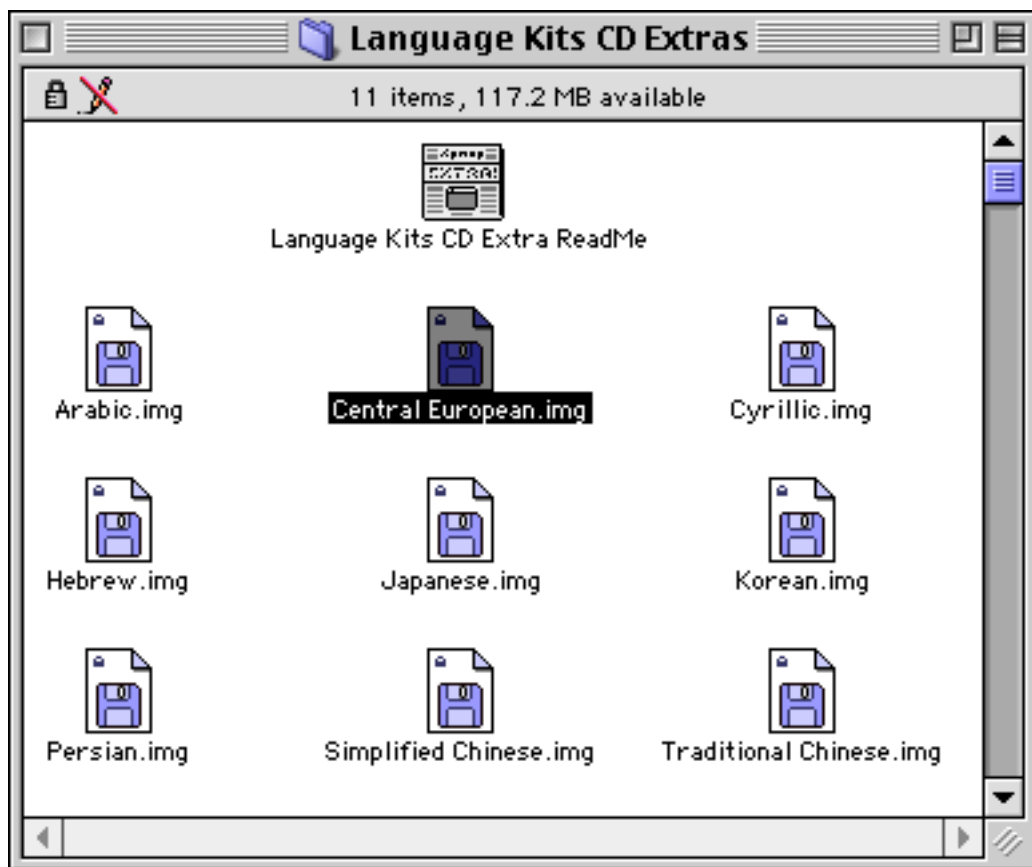
Step 13

When the installation is complete, the alert shown below appears. Click the “Restart” button to restart your Mac.



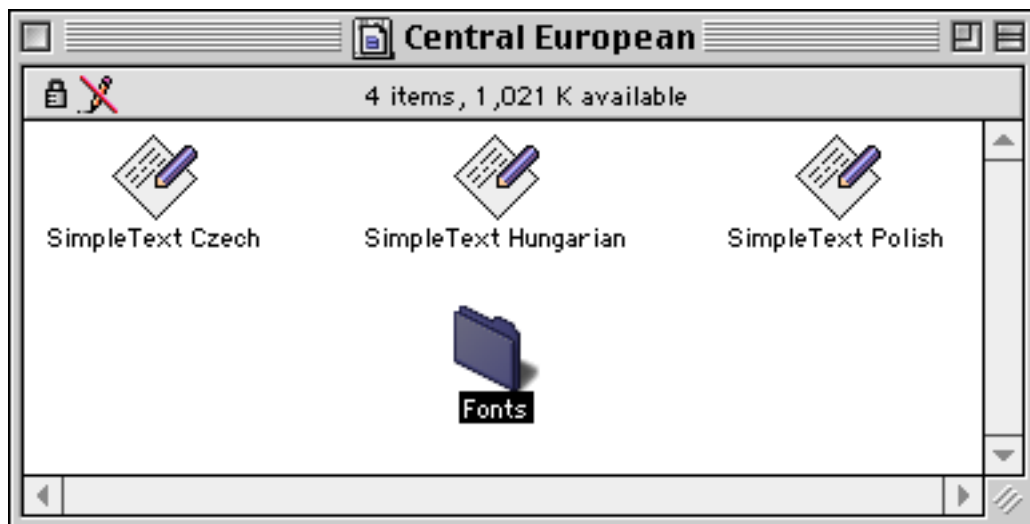
Step 14

After your Mac has restarted, open your Mac OS 9 CD again. Open the “CD Extras” folder. Scroll down and open the “Language Kits CD Extras” folder. Double-click the “Central European.img” icon to open it.



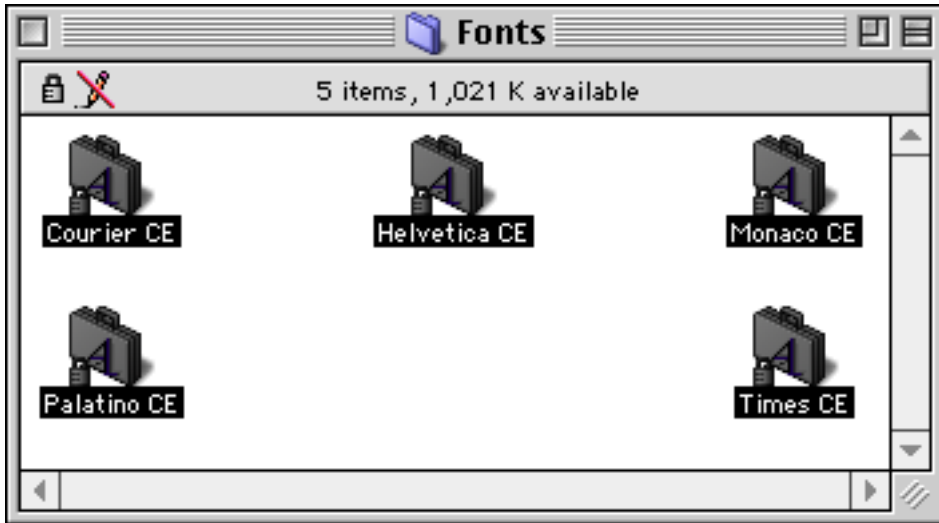
Step 15

A disk icon named “Central European” appears on your desktop. Double-click the disk icon to open it, then open the “Fonts” folder.



Step 16

Select all five of the fonts and drag them on top of your System Folder icon to install them.



Step 17

The following alert appears. Click the “OK” button to complete the installation of the fonts.
